When you have an "Exodus" standing out all tall and wonky, you have to remember, God is telling you it is time to give yourself grace just as He gives us everyday.

## MAKING GOD'S GRACE OUR GRACE

When was the last time someone showed you grace? For me, it was when I showed up an hour late for a meeting, having confused the time! I was assured by others in the group that they had done the same thing at times, was told to think nothing of it, and then they followed



up personally with encouraging words! I was embarrassed, but shown grace.

In our ministry of providing education to remote Liberia, we have experienced misunderstandings, pride, and accusations—many of which have cultural leanings. In order to fortify our relationships, we are challenged to listen, try to understand the position of others, compromise if possible, and affirm our mutual goal of helping disadvantaged students grow in their skills, expand their minds, and experience more of God. Only by being grateful for the grace that God has shown us, do we have the courage and strength to extend it to others—especially when it's hard.

We can find many examples of God's grace in both Old and New Testaments. Noah and his family were allowed to experience grace by deliverance from God's judgment upon the

world. Time and again foolish Israel forsook God, yet He continued to offer restoration upon repentance, regardless of the unfaithfulness which had been flaunted in the face of His grace. But God, in the epitome of grace, sent the Messiah, His own Son, to pay for the sins of His people.

Simeon and Ana, in their old age, were allowed to look upon the face of the infant Jesus. Jesus Himself offered grace to the crippled, the blind, and the lepers. The book of Romans affirms that God offers His grace toward all the world, not just the Jews, opening up the Gospel to the ends of the earth. If we were to imagine the most despicable sins, multiply them to the highest degree and by all whom He redeems—that would illustrate the depth of the grace of God. The acronym, God's Riches At Christ's Expense, describes the sacrifice He made to extend that grace. It's an amazing grace!



So where have you received grace? And where have you extended it? When we experience accusations, name calling, hurtful gossip, or other attacks, our ability to issue grace is tested. I pray that through our gratefulness for all God has done for us, we will accept the challenge to show grace to all we meet.

As II Corinthians 12: 9-10 reminds us, God's grace is sufficient! This scripture is a timely reminder for all of us to choose to rejoice always,


praising the Lord despite what He allowed us to experience. Don't be defeated because of the trials you are facing, rely on Him, and trust in His Promises!

At Little Rock Ministries (LRM) we act on our love for the residents of Pinecrest Mobile Home Park in Eldora. We offer twice weekly after school clubs for the children (K-12) and Bible study groups for both men and women. These programs are offered to spread the Gospel, teach God's grace, forgiveness, and love, which is available to all. We let them know they are precious to God. They need to be given a second chance or a new beginning, just like the rest of us have been given.

Our board members and volunteers also do what we can to see to not only to the spiritual needs of the residents but also their physical needs. We provide back-to-school supplies and generous Christmas gifts to all the children in the park, not just to the ones who attend the clubs. Scholarships are given so kids can attend local Bible camps. A trailer in the park is made available and maintained for our clubs and meetings. We can do these things with the substantial support of local churches,

organizations and individuals through their prayers and donations.

Grace, unmerited favor, is the focus of LRM and their supporters. One example is when teaching the club kids about good manners, such as saying please and thank you and taking turns when speaking. The adults give grace for the children

because the kids may not be used to behaving in this way, so it takes time for them to develop these polite habits. We are doubly blessed when grace is not only given by teachers and leaders but also when grace is given by the children to each

other. They are like brothers and sisters – they may quibble amongst themselves, but they also stand up for one another with understanding.

Thank you to all those who act in grace and love for our residents. They are people in need of support. LRM is a worthy cause and the residents we serve need and appreciate the support from our community.

Grace is God's unmerited favor; it is His kindness and forgiveness that we did not earn or deserve. But He gives us grace for our transgressions anyway. God commands us to give grace to others as we continue to become more like Jesus. At Safe Families for Children, we strive to create extended family-like relationships in our ministry. It seems fair to state there is a solid correlation of giving and receiving grace in any healthy relationship.

Giving grace is an important aspect in our daily efforts as we work to establish healthy and trusting connections with those who have reached out for support. I often remind myself and encourage others to 'give a little grace' when providing support. We are given the gift of grace by Him and are to pass this grace on to others, without judgment. It's not unusual for us to take a needed step back while trying to understand the situation from the lens of the parent. When we misunderstand someone's situation or actions, we can choose assumptions and judgement, or we can choose to listen with grace and understanding. What might seem like a simple fix to those on the outside, generally is a manifestation of a lifetime of events adding layers to years of despair, disappointment, and isolation. So...we give grace.

I witness grace in our ministry daily. I see host families bring children into their homes knowing the parent is in prison for assault, heading to substance abuse treatment for the fourth time, or perhaps in a situation where they have become homeless due to the inability

to maintain stable employment. I see our host families give grace, not judging the past but rather simply focusing on the future. I have also seen our host families open their homes to the child's mother for Sunday dinner, for the weekend, or even weeks at a time. Our focus at Safe Families is to support the parents through long-term relationships while giving them grace through some of the most challenging moments of their life. It is truly 'amazing grace'.

We extend God's grace to others because it is the foundation of relationships. His abundant grace works through us and provides us with the ability to have compassion for those who need us most. 

There are consequences to all our actions and some are negative; however, grace helps us approach the issues in a way that changes the impact of the consequences in so many ways.
